


Appreciation

Meet at Flo's Farmhouse Cafeteria on the corner of Van Buren and Philbin Ave. (just south of Van Buren and Arlington Ave.) (Thomas Bros. Pg 99 A-2) in Riverside at 8:00 a.m. for breakfast. At or about 9:30 a.m. we will depart for March Air Force Base Air Museum (I-215 and Van Buren Blvd.). Plans are to visit the museum and survey the site for a possible location for next year's truck show. Around 12:30 p.m. we will depart for Bill Loure's place (60 Freeway east of the 91/215 interchange exit on Blaine St., go east on Blaine to 316 E. Blaine to the end of the pavement).

Minutes of the September 21 ATHS-SCC General Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 8:10 p.m. at Dunkel Brothers Trucking in Anaheim with Don McCann presiding. A quorum was present with Jerry Haworth, Leigh Knudson, George Gunther, Jim Wantland Sr., Jim Wantland Jr., Carl Stephenson, Tim Benson, Herb Deeks, Roland Smith, Larry Laughlin, Mark Christensen, Dan Gosnell, Ron Berg, and Jim Wade in attendance. Guests in attendance were Clint Herring and Peter Dunkel, the host.

The first order of business was the annual turnaround scheduled for October 15, 1994. We will meet at Flo's Farmhouse Cafe (5620 Van Buren Blvd. Riverside (909) 352-2690). It is located approximately 1/2 mile south of Arlington Avenue at Philbin Avenue. We will leave Flo's at 9:30 a.m., so if you want breakfast arrive early. The route will include a brief stop at Sherman Indian High School, a potential site for the 95 Truck Show. The mid point of the route will be about 11:00 a.m. at another potential Truck Show site, March Air Force Base Antique Plane Museum (Van Buren Avenue and Interstate 215 (909) 655-2138). From there we will head for "Bill Loure's reservoir" (316 E. Blaine Street (909) 682 2053) with lunch scheduled about 1:00 p.m. The cost will be \$10 and will include lunch and a dash plaque. Detailed route instructions will be given at Flo's Saturday morning. If you have any questions, call Jerry Haworth (909) 980-0611.

The next order of business was the 11th Annual Truck Show. Since it will not be at the C.S.D.R. as in years past, an alternate site must be selected as soon as possible. A site selection committee was formed including Tim Benson, Jim Wantland Sr., Leigh Knudson, and Ken Lund. While not in attendance, it was suggested that Steve Sackett be allowed to be on the committee, at his option, due to the extensive work he has already done in pre-show planning. Possible sites include: California High School, Whittier; U.C. Irvine, Irvine; Chino Fairgrounds, Chino; March Air Force Base Antique Plane Museum, Riverside; and Sherman Indian High School, Riverside. The committee will assess the benefits of each site and bring the final recommendation to the November meeting. A show chairman will be appointed to coordinate the rest of the show planning and operations.

Next, nomination and election of officers was discussed. A motion was made that we hold off until the club bi-laws are reviewed and/or amended. As a model, it was suggested that we

consider obtaining a copy before our next meeting. Discussion was made considering changing the name of the "Board of Directors" to "Executive Committee", with no decision made. It was approved that Ron Berg be added to the Board of Directors, replacing George Gunther. Election of officers will be at the November meeting.

The next topic was the general meeting scheduled for December 4 at George Gunther's Yard. Also in attendance at the meeting will be the military Vehicle Club, Model T Club, and Antique Motorcycle Club. Bring your "old iron" if you want. As usual refreshments will be provided and it is open to all members. Directions and time to follow. For information call George Gunther (213) 429-1597.

Roland Smith gave a progress report of National ATHS business. The "home of our own" project for the permanent location of National ATHS Headquarters is progressing well, with many individuals and chapters donating funds. Worldwide, there are now over 65 individual chapters.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:35 p.m. Thanks goes to Peter Dunkel for his hospitality in hosting a place for the meeting.



Excerpts from <u>Dodge Military</u> Vehicles <u>Collection No. 1</u>, 1940-1945,



Today's 4x4's from Chrysler have an interesting geneology.

"Sixty Years of Military Dodges" by Konrad F. Schreier, Jr.

Dodge entered the automobile manufacturing business in 1914, and its first production model was a 1915, 4-cylinder passenger car. In 1916 Dodge sold its regular production automobiles to the U.S. military forces and have used Dodges ever since.

It all began with trouble along the border due to the Mexican revolution, which started in 1910. The U.S. Army had been building a force to cope with possible forays. The problem became



serious when Pancho Villa attacked Columbus, NM on the night of March 9, 1916. The U.S. Army, promptly organizing a "punitive expedition" to chase Villa around northern Mexico, procured its first large quantity of motor vehicles to support the expedition. Dodge cars were among the most successful of these machines.

The first U.S. Army Dodges were standard 4-cylinder open touring cars. They were driven on

long runs through the deserts and mountains of northern Mexico, and they stood up to this rugged, roadless service. General John T. Pershing, commander of the expedition, used them constantly and thought very highly of them. Lieutenant George S. Patton, later famous in World War II, got his first motorized combat lessons in the Dodges of the punitive expedition.

At least two of the 250 "Mexican" Dodges have survived and are in operating condition. One, at West Point, N.Y., is supposed to have been used by General Pershing himself both in Mexico and later in France during World War I. The other, in the Ordnance Museum at Aberdeen Proving Ground, MD., is supposed to be Lt. Patton's.

The U.S. entered World War I on April 7, 1917, when everything that had happened in Mexico was fresh in military memory. The U.S. Army was determined to motorize itself during its participation in World War I, and the Dodge,

which had been SO successful in Mexico, figured near the top of the list of the machines they wanted. The Army procured some 7,400 Dodge cylinder passenger cars, of which

several thousand saw service in France. They even bought 175 roadsters, which helped train troops in the U.S.A.

Even more important were the Dodge trucks that the U.S. Army created--the first to bear the Dodge name. The Army made them by taking standard Dodge 4-cylinder passenger car chassis and building a pickup type "light repair body" on them.
